This CONTRACT (hereinafter called the "Contract") is made the 16th day of the month of March, 2018, between, on the one hand, Assam Rural Infrastructure and Agricultural Services (ARIAS) Society of the Government of Assam(hereinafter called the "Client") and, on the other hand, the International Livestock Research Institute or "ILRI", Box 30709, Naivasha Rd, Nairobi- 00100, Kenya, (hereinafter called the "Consultant").

WHEREAS

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- (a) the Client has requested the Consultant to provide certain consulting services as defined in this Contract (hereinafter called the "Services");
- (b) the Consultant, having represented to the Client that it has the required professional skills, expertise and technical resources, has agreed to provide the Services on the terms and conditions set forth in this Contract;
- (c) the Client has received a loan from the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) toward the cost of the Services and intends to apply a portion of the proceeds of this loan to eligible payments under this Contract, it being understood that (i) payments by the Bank will be made only at the request of the Client and upon approval by the Bank; (ii) such payments will be subject, in all respects, to the terms and conditions of the loan agreement, including prohibitions of withdrawal from the loan account for the purpose of any payment to persons or entities, or for any import of goods, if such payment or import, to the knowledge of the Bank, is prohibited by the decision of the United Nations Security council taken under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations; and (iii) no party other than the Client shall derive any rights from the loan agreement or have any claim to the loan proceeds;

NOW THEREFORE the parties hereto hereby agree as follows:



II. General Conditions of Contract

A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 1. **Definitions** 1.1 Unless the context otherwise requires, the following terms whenever used in this Contract have the following meanings:
 - (a) "Applicable Law" means the laws and any other instruments having the force of law in the Client's country, or in such other country as may be specified in the Special Conditions of Contract (SCC), as they may be issued and in force from time to time.
 - (b) "Applicable Regulations" means Procurement Regulations for IPF Borrowers of date specified in **Special Conditions of Contract (SCC)**.
 - (c) "Bank" means the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) or the International Development Association (IDA).
 - (d) "Borrower" means the Government, Government agency or other entity that signs the financing agreement with the Bank.
 - (e) "Client" means the implementing agency that signs the Contract for the Services with the Selected Consultant.
 - (f) "Consultant" means a legally-established professional consulting firm or entity selected by the Client to provide the Services under the signed Contract.
 - (g) "Contract" means the legally binding written agreement signed between the Client and the Consultant and which includes all the attached documents listed in its paragraph 1 of the Form of Contract (the General Conditions (GCC), the Special Conditions (SCC), and the Appendices).
 - (h) "Day" means a working day unless indicated otherwise.
 - (i) "Effective Date" means the date on which this Contract comes into force and effect pursuant to Clause GCC 11.
 - (j) "Experts" means, collectively, Key Experts, Non-Key Experts, or any other personnel of the Consultant, Sub-consultant or JV member(s) assigned by the Consultant to perform the Services or any part thereof under the Contract.
 - (k) "Foreign Currency" means any currency other than the currency of the Client's country.
 - (I) "GCC" means these General Conditions of Contract.
 - (m) "Government" means the government of the Client's country.
 - (n) "Joint Venture (JV)" means an association with or without a legal personality distinct from that of its members, of more than one entity where one member has the authority to conduct all businesses for and on behalf of any and all the members of the JV, and where the members of the JV are jointly and severally liable to the Client for the performance of the Contract.
 - (o) "Key Expert(s)" means an individual professional whose skills, qualifications, knowledge and experience are critical to the performance of the Services under the Contract and whose Curricula Vitae (CV) was taken into account in the technical evaluation of the Consultant's proposal.

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- (p) "Local Currency" means the currency of the Client's country.
- (q) "Non-Key Expert(s)" means an individual professional provided by the Consultant or its Sub-consultant to perform the Services or any part thereof under the Contract.
- (r) "Party" means the Client or the Consultant, as the case may be, and "Parties" means both of them.
- (s) "Procurement Regulations" means the World Bank's Procurement Regulations for IPF Borrowers,
- (t) "SCC" means the Special Conditions of Contract by which the GCC may be amended or supplemented but not over-written.
- (u) "Services" means the work to be performed by the Consultant pursuant to this Contract, as described in Appendix A hereto.
- (v) "Sub-consultants" means an entity to whom/which the Consultant subcontracts any part of the Services while remaining solely liable for the execution of the Contract.
- (w) "Third Party" means any person or entity other than the Government, the Client, the Consultant or a Sub-consultant.
- Relationship between the Parties
 2.1. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as establishing a relationship of master and servant or of principal and agent as between the Client and the Consultant. The Consultant, subject to this Contract, has complete charge of the Experts and Sub-consultants, if any, performing the Services and shall be fully responsible for the Services performed by them or on their behalf hereunder.
- **3.** Law Governing 3.1. This Contract, its meaning and interpretation, and the relation between the Parties shall be governed by the Applicable Law.
- 4.1. This Contract has been executed in the language specified in the SCC, which shall be the binding and controlling language for all matters relating to the meaning or interpretation of this Contract.
- 5. Headings 5.1. The headings shall not limit, alter or affect the meaning of this Contract.
- 6. Communications
 6.1. Any communication required or permitted to be given or made pursuant to this Contract shall be in writing in the language specified in Clause GCC 4. Any such notice, request or consent shall be deemed to have been given or made when delivered in person to an authorized representative of the Party to whom the communication is addressed, or when sent to such Party at the address specified in the SCC.

6.2. A Party may change its address for notice hereunder by giving the other Party any communication of such change to the address specified in the **SCC**.

7.1. The Services shall be performed at such locations as are specified in **Appendix A** hereto and, where the location of a particular task is not so specified, at such locations, whether in the Government's country or elsewhere, as the Client may approve.

 8. Authority of Member in Charge
 8.1. In case the Consultant is a Joint Venture, the members hereby authorize the member specified in the SCC to act on their behalf in exercising all the Consultant's rights and obligations towards the Client under this Contract, including without limitation the receiving of instructions and

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payments from the Client.

- 9. Authorized Representatives
 9.1. Any action required or permitted to be taken, and any document required or permitted to be executed under this Contract by the Client or the Consultant may be taken or executed by the officials specified in the SCC.
- 10. Fraud and
Corruption10.1 The Bank requires compliance with the Bank's Anti-Corruption
Guidelines and its prevailing sanctions policies and procedures as set forth in
the WBG's Sanctions Framework, as set forth in Attachment 1 to the GCC.
 - a. Commissions and Fees 10.2 The Client requires the Consultant to disclose any commissions, gratuities or fees that may have been paid or are to be paid to agents or any other party with respect to the selection process or execution of the Contract. The information disclosed must include at least the name and address of the agent or other party, the amount and currency, and the purpose of the commission, gratuity or fee. Failure to disclose such commissions, gratuities or fees may result in termination of the Contract and/or sanctions by the Bank.

B. COMMENCEMENT, COMPLETION, MODIFICATION AND TERMINATION OF CONTRACT

- 11. Effectiveness of
Contract11.1. This Contract shall come into force and effect on the date (the
"Effective Date") of the Client's notice to the Consultant instructing the
Consultant to begin carrying out the Services. This notice shall confirm that
the effectiveness conditions, if any, listed in the SCC have been met.
- 12. Termination of Contract for Failure to Become Effective
 12.1. If this Contract has not become effective within such time period after the date of Contract signature as specified in the SCC, either Party may, by not less than twenty two (22) days written notice to the other Party, declare this Contract to be null and void, and in the event of such a declaration by either Party, neither Party shall have any claim against the other Party with respect hereto.
- 13. Commencement of
Services13.1. The Consultant shall confirm availability of Key Experts and begin
carrying out the Services not later than the number of days after the Effective
Date specified in the SCC.
- 14. Expiration of
Contract14.1. Unless terminated earlier pursuant to Clause GCC 19 hereof, this
Contract shall expire at the end of such time period after the Effective Date as
specified in the SCC.
- **15. Entire Agreement 15.1.** This Contract contains all covenants, stipulations and provisions agreed by the Parties. No agent or representative of either Party has authority to make, and the Parties shall not be bound by or be liable for, any statement, representation, promise or agreement not set forth herein.
- 16. Modifications or
Variations16.1. Any modification or variation of the terms and conditions of this
Contract, including any modification or variation of the scope of the Services,
may only be made by written agreement between the Parties. However, each
Party shall give due consideration to any proposals for modification or
variation made by the other Party.

16.2. In cases of substantial modifications or variations, the prior written consent of the Bank is required.

17. Force Majeure

a. Definition

17.1. For the purposes of this Contract, "Force Majeure" means an event which is beyond the reasonable control of a Party, is not foreseeable, is unavoidable, and makes a Party's performance of its obligations hereunder impossible or so impractical as reasonably to be considered impossible under the circumstances, and subject to those requirements, includes, but is not limited to, war, riots, civil disorder, earthquake, fire, explosion, storm,

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flood or other adverse weather conditions, strikes, lockouts or other industrial action confiscation or any other action by Government agencies.

17.2. Force Majeure shall not include (i) any event which is caused by the negligence or intentional action of a Party or such Party's Experts, Subconsultants or agents or employees, nor (ii) any event which a diligent Party could reasonably have been expected to both take into account at the time of the conclusion of this Contract, and avoid or overcome in the carrying out of its obligations hereunder.

17.3. Force Majeure shall not include insufficiency of funds or failure to make any payment required hereunder.

- b. No Breach of Contract 17.4. The failure of a Party to fulfill any of its obligations hereunder shall not be considered to be a breach of, or default under, this Contract insofar as such inability arises from an event of Force Majeure, provided that the Party affected by such an event has taken all reasonable precautions, due care and reasonable alternative measures, all with the objective of carrying out the terms and conditions of this Contract.
- c. Measures to be Taken
 17.5. A Party affected by an event of Force Majeure shall continue to perform its obligations under the Contract as far as is reasonably practical, and shall take all reasonable measures to minimize the consequences of any event of Force Majeure.

17.6. A Party affected by an event of Force Majeure shall notify the other Party of such event as soon as possible, and in any case not later than fourteen (14) calendar days following the occurrence of such event, providing evidence of the nature and cause of such event, and shall similarly give written notice of the restoration of normal conditions as soon as possible.

17.7. Any period within which a Party shall, pursuant to this Contract, complete any action or task, shall be extended for a period equal to the time during which such Party was unable to perform such action as a result of Force Majeure.

17.8. During the period of their inability to perform the Services as a result of an event of Force Majeure, the Consultant, upon instructions by the Client, shall either:

- (a) demobilize, in which case the Consultant shall be reimbursed for additional costs they reasonably and necessarily incurred, and, if required by the Client, in reactivating the Services; or
- (b) continue with the Services to the extent reasonably possible, in which case the Consultant shall continue to be paid under the terms of this Contract and be reimbursed for additional costs reasonably and necessarily incurred.

17.9. In the case of disagreement between the Parties as to the existence or extent of Force Majeure, the matter shall be settled according to Clauses GCC 44 & 45.

18. Suspension

18.1. The Client may, by written notice of suspension to the Consultant, suspend part or all payments to the Consultant hereunder if the Consultant fails to perform any of its obligations under this Contract, including the carrying out of the Services, provided that such notice of suspension (i) shall specify the nature of the failure, and (ii) shall request the Consultant to remedy such failure within a period not exceeding thirty (30) calendar days after receipt by the Consultant of such notice of suspension.

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a. By the Client

19.1.1. The Client may terminate this Contract in case of the occurrence of any of the events specified in paragraphs (a) through (f) of this Clause. In such an occurrence the Client shall give at least thirty (30) calendar days' written notice of termination to the Consultant in case of the events referred to in (a) through (d); at least sixty (60) calendar days' written notice in case of the event referred to in (e); and at least five (5) calendar days' written notice in case of the event referred to in (f):

- (a) If the Consultant fails to remedy a failure in the performance of its obligations hereunder, as specified in a notice of suspension pursuant to Clause GCC 18;
- (b) If the Consultant becomes (or, if the Consultant consists of more than one entity, if any of its members becomes) insolvent or bankrupt or enter into any agreements with their creditors for relief of debt or take advantage of any law for the benefit of debtors or go into liquidation or receivership whether compulsory or voluntary;
- (c) If the Consultant fails to comply with any final decision reached as a result of arbitration proceedings pursuant to Clause GCC 45.1;
- (d) If, as the result of Force Majeure, the Consultant is unable to perform a material portion of the Services for a period of not less than sixty (60) calendar days;
- (e) If the Client, in its sole discretion and for any reason whatsoever, decides to terminate this Contract;
- (f) If the Consultant fails to confirm availability of Key Experts as required in Clause GCC 13.

19.1.2. Furthermore, if the Client determines that the Consultant has engaged in Fraud and Corruption in competing for or in executing the Contract, then the Client may, after giving fourteen (14) calendar days written notice to the Consultant, terminate the Consultant's employment under the Contract.

19.1.3. The Consultant may terminate this Contract, by not less than thirty (30) calendar days' written notice to the Client, in case of the occurrence of any of the events specified in paragraphs (a) through (d) of this Clause.

- (a) If the Client fails to pay any money due to the Consultant pursuant to this Contract and not subject to dispute pursuant to Clause GCC 45.1 within forty-five (45) calendar days after receiving written notice from the Consultant that such payment is overdue.
- (b) If, as the result of Force Majeure, the Consultant is unable to perform a material portion of the Services for a period of not less than sixty (60) calendar days.
- (c) If the Client fails to comply with any final decision reached as a result of arbitration pursuant to Clause GCC 45.1.
- (d) If the Client is in material breach of its obligations pursuant to this Contract and has not remedied the same within forty-five (45) days (or such longer period as the Consultant may have subsequently approved in writing) following the receipt by the Client of the Consultant's notice specifying such breach.

Upon termination of this Contract by notice of either Party to the other pursuant to Clauses GCC 19a or GCC 19b, the Consultant shall, immediately upon dispatch or receipt of such notice, take all necessary steps to bring the Services to a close in a prompt and orderly manner and shall make every reasonable effort to keep expenditures for this purpose to a minimum. With respect to documents prepared by the Consultant and equipment and materials furnished by the Client, the Consultant shall proceed as provided, respectively, by Clauses GCC 27 or GCC 28.
- e.Payment upon
Termination19.1.6.Upon termination of this Contract, the Client shall make the
following payments to the Consultant:
 - (a) payment for Services satisfactorily performed prior to the effective date of termination; and
 - (b) in the case of termination pursuant to paragraphs (d) and (e) of Clause GCC 19.1.1, reimbursement of any reasonable cost incidental to the prompt and orderly termination of this Contract, including the cost of the return travel of the Experts.

C. OBLIGATIONS OF THE CONSULTANT

20. General a. Sta

Standard of

Performance

20.1 The Consultant shall perform the Services and carry out the Services with all due diligence, efficiency and economy, in accordance with generally accepted professional standards and practices, and shall observe sound management practices, and employ appropriate technology and safe and effective equipment, machinery, materials and methods. The Consultant shall always act, in respect of any matter relating to this Contract or to the Services, as a faithful adviser to the Client, and shall at all times support and safeguard the Client's legitimate interests in any dealings with the third parties.

20.2. The Consultant shall employ and provide such qualified and experienced Experts and Sub-consultants as are required to carry out the Services.

20.3. The Consultant may subcontract part of the Services to an extent and with such Key Experts and Sub-consultants as may be approved in advance by the Client. Notwithstanding such approval, the Consultant shall retain full responsibility for the Services.

b. Law Applicable 20.4. The Consultant shall perform the Services in accordance with the Contract and the Applicable Law and shall take all practicable steps to ensure that any of its Experts and Sub-consultants, comply with the Applicable Law.

20.5. Throughout the execution of the Contract, the Consultant shall comply with the import of goods and services prohibitions in the Client's country when



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- as a matter of law or official regulations, the Borrower's country (a) prohibits commercial relations with that country; or
- by an act of compliance with a decision of the United Nations (b) Security Council taken under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations, the Borrower's Country prohibits any import of goods from that country or any payments to any country, person, or entity in that country.

20.6. The Client shall notify the Consultant in writing of relevant local customs, and the Consultant shall, after such notification, respect such customs.

- 21. Conflict of Interest The Consultant shall hold the Client's interests paramount, without 21.1. any consideration for future work, and strictly avoid conflict with other assignments or their own corporate interests.
 - **Consultant Not** The payment of the Consultant pursuant to GCC F (Clauses a. 21.1.1 to Benefit from GCC 38 through 42) shall constitute the Consultant's only payment in Commissions, connection with this Contract and, subject to Clause GCC 21.1.3, the Discounts, etc. Consultant shall not accept for its own benefit any trade commission, discount or similar payment in connection with activities pursuant to this Contract or in the discharge of its obligations hereunder, and the Consultant shall use its best efforts to ensure that any Sub-consultants, as well as the Experts and agents of either of them, similarly shall not receive any such additional payment.

Furthermore, if the Consultant, as part of the Services, has the 21.1.2 responsibility of advising the Client on the procurement of goods, works or services, the Consultant shall comply with the Bank's Applicable Regulations, and shall at all times exercise such responsibility in the best interest of the Client. Any discounts or commissions obtained by the Consultant in the exercise of such procurement responsibility shall be for the account of the Client.

Consultant and 21.1.3 The Consultant agrees that, during the term of this Contract and after its termination, the Consultant and any entity affiliated with Affiliates Not to the Consultant, as well as any Sub-consultants and any entity affiliated Engage in Certain with such Sub-consultants, shall be disqualified from providing goods, Activities works or non-consulting services resulting from or directly related to the Consultant's Services for the preparation or implementation of the project.

> 21.1.4 The Consultant shall not engage, and shall cause its Experts as well as its Sub-consultants not to engage, either directly or indirectly, in any business or professional activities that would conflict with the activities assigned to them under this Contract.

21.1.5 The Consultant has an obligation and shall ensure that its Experts and Sub-consultants shall have an obligation to disclose any situation of actual or potential conflict that impacts their capacity to serve the best interest of their Client, or that may reasonably be perceived as having this effect. Failure to disclose said situations may lead to the disqualification of the Consultant or the termination of its Contract.

22.1 Except with the prior written consent of the Client, the Consultant and the Experts shall not at any time communicate to any person or entity any confidential information acquired in the course of the Services, nor shall the Consultant and the Experts make public the recommendations formulated in the course of, or as a result of, the Services.

23.1 Subject to additional provisions, if any, set forth in the **SCC**, the Consultant's liability under this Contract shall be provided by the Applicable Law.

24.1 The Consultant (i) shall take out and maintain, and shall cause any Sub-consultants to take out and maintain, at its (or the Sub-consultants', as the case may be) own cost but on terms and conditions approved by the Client, insurance against the risks, and for the coverage specified in the **SCC**, and (ii) at the Client's request, shall provide evidence to the Client showing that such insurance has been taken out and maintained and that the current premiums therefore have been paid. The Consultant shall ensure that such insurance is in place prior to commencing the Services as stated in Clause GCC 13.

 25. Accounting, Inspection and Auditing
 25.1 The Consultant shall keep, and shall make all reasonable efforts to cause its Sub-consultants to keep, accurate and systematic accounts and records in respect of the Services and in such form and detail as will clearly identify relevant time changes and costs.

> 25.2 Pursuant to paragraph 2.2 e. of Appendix to the General Conditions the Consultant shall permit and shall cause its subcontractors and subconsultants to permit, the Bank and/or persons appointed by the Bank to inspect the Site and/or the accounts and records relating to the performance of the Contract and the submission of the bid, and to have such accounts and records audited by auditors appointed by the Bank if requested by the Bank. The Consultant's and its Subcontractors' and subconsultants' attention is drawn to Sub-Clause 10.1 which provides, inter alia, that acts intended to materially impede the exercise of the Bank's inspection and audit rights constitute a prohibited practice subject to contract termination (as well as to a determination of ineligibility pursuant to the Bank's prevailing sanctions procedures).

26. Reporting Obligations 26.1 The Consultant shall submit to the Client the reports and documents specified in **Appendix A**, in the form, in the numbers and within the time periods set forth in the said Appendix.

27.1 Unless otherwise indicated in the **SCC**, all reports and relevant data and information such as maps, diagrams, plans, databases, other documents and software, supporting records or material compiled or prepared by the Consultant for the Client in the course of the Services shall be confidential and become and remain the absolute property of the Client. The Consultant shall, not later than upon termination or expiration of this Contract, deliver all such documents to the Client, together with a detailed inventory thereof. The Consultant may retain a copy of such documents, data and/or software but shall not use the same for purposes unrelated to this Contract without prior written approval of the Client.

27.2 If license agreements are necessary or appropriate between the Consultant and third parties for purposes of development of the plans, drawings, specifications, designs, databases, other documents and software, the Consultant shall obtain the Client's prior written approval to such agreements, and the Client shall be entitled at its discretion to require recovering the expenses related to the development of the program(s) concerned. Other restrictions about the future use of these documents and software, if any, shall be specified in the **SCC**.

28.1 Equipment, vehicles and materials made available to the Consultant by the Client, or purchased by the Consultant wholly or partly with funds provided by the Client, shall be the property of the Client and shall be marked accordingly. Upon termination or expiration of this Contract, the Consultant shall make available to the Client an inventory of such equipment, vehicles and materials and shall dispose of such equipment, vehicles and materials in accordance with the Client's instructions. While in possession of such

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28. Equipment, Vehicles

and Materials

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equipment, vehicles and materials, the Consultant, unless otherwise instructed by the Client in writing, shall insure them at the expense of the Client in an amount equal to their full replacement value.

28.2 Any equipment or materials brought by the Consultant or its Experts into the Client's country for the use either for the project or personal use shall remain the property of the Consultant or the Experts concerned, as applicable.

D. CONSULTANT'S EXPERTS AND SUB-CONSULTANTS

- 29. Description of Key 29.1 The title, agreed job description, minimum qualification and estimated period of engagement to carry out the Services of each of the Consultant's Key Experts are described in Appendix B.
- **30. Replacement of Key**
Experts30.1Except as the Client may otherwise agree in writing, no changes shall
be made in the Key Experts.

30.2 Notwithstanding the above, the substitution of Key Experts during Contract execution may be considered only based on the Consultant's written request and due to circumstances outside the reasonable control of the Consultant, including but not limited to death or medical incapacity. In such case, the Consultant shall forthwith provide as a replacement, a person of equivalent or better qualifications and experience, and at the same rate of remuneration.

31. Removal of Experts or Sub-consultants
 31.1 If the Client finds that any of the Experts or Sub-consultant has committed serious misconduct or has been charged with having committed a criminal action, or if the Client determines that a Consultant's Expert or Sub-consultant has engaged in Fraud and Corruption while performing the Services, the Consultant shall, at the Client's written request, provide a replacement.

31.2 In the event that any of Key Experts, Non-Key Experts or Subconsultants is found by the Client to be incompetent or incapable in discharging assigned duties, the Client, specifying the grounds therefore, may request the Consultant to provide a replacement.

31.3 Any replacement of the removed Experts or Sub-consultants shall possess better qualifications and experience and shall be acceptable to the Client.

31.4 The Consultant shall bear all costs arising out of or incidental to any removal and/or replacement of such Experts.

E. OBLIGATIONS OF THE CLIENT

32.1 Unless otherwise specified in the **SCC**, the Client shall use its best efforts to:

- (a) Assist the Consultant with obtaining work permits and such other documents as shall be necessary to enable the Consultant to perform the Services.
- (b) Assist the Consultant with promptly obtaining, for the Experts and, if appropriate, their eligible dependents, all necessary entry and exit visas, residence permits, exchange permits and any other documents required for their stay in the Client's country while carrying out the Services under the Contract.
- (c) Facilitate prompt clearance through customs of any property required for the Services and of the personal effects of the Experts and their eligible dependents.

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32. Assistance and

Exemptions

- (c) Issue to officials, agents and representatives of the Government all such instructions and information as may be necessary or appropriate for the prompt and effective implementation of the Services.
- (d) Assist the Consultant and the Experts and any Sub-consultants employed by the Consultant for the Services with obtaining exemption from any requirement to register or obtain any permit to practice their profession or to establish themselves either individually or as a corporate entity in the Client's country according to the applicable law in the Client's country.
- (e) Assist the Consultant, any Sub-consultants and the Experts of either of them with obtaining the privilege, pursuant to the applicable law in the Client's country, of bringing into the Client's country reasonable amounts of foreign currency for the purposes of the Services or for the personal use of the Experts and of withdrawing any such amounts as may be earned therein by the Experts in the execution of the Services.
- (f) Provide to the Consultant any such other assistance as may be specified in the **SCC**.
- **33.** Access to Project Site 33.1 The Client warrants that the Consultant shall have, free of charge, unimpeded access to the project site in respect of which access is required for the performance of the Services. The Client will be responsible for any damage to the project site or any property thereon resulting from such access and will indemnify the Consultant and each of the experts in respect of liability for any such damage, unless such damage is caused by the willful default or negligence of the Consultant or any Sub-consultants or the Experts of either of them.
- 34. Change in the Applicable Law Related to Taxes and Duties
 34.1 If, after the date of this Contract, there is any change in the applicable law in the Client's country with respect to taxes and duties which increases or decreases the cost incurred by the Consultant in performing the Services, then the remuneration and reimbursable expenses otherwise payable to the Consultant under this Contract shall be increased or decreased accordingly by agreement between the Parties hereto, and corresponding adjustments shall be made to the Contract price amount specified in Clause GCC 38.1

35. Services, Facilities
and Property of the
Client35.1The Client shall make available to the Consultant and the Experts, for
the purposes of the Services and free of any charge, the services, facilities and
property described in the Terms of Reference (Appendix A) at the times and
in the manner specified in said Appendix A.

36.1 The Client shall make available to the Consultant free of charge such professional and support counterpart personnel, to be nominated by the Client with the Consultant's advice, if specified in **Appendix A**.

36.2 Professional and support counterpart personnel, excluding Client's liaison personnel, shall work under the exclusive direction of the Consultant. If any member of the counterpart personnel fails to perform adequately any work assigned to such member by the Consultant that is consistent with the position occupied by such member, the Consultant may request the replacement of such member, and the Client shall not unreasonably refuse to act upon such request.

37. Payment Obligation 37.1 In consideration of the Services performed by the Consultant under this Contract, the Client shall make such payments to the Consultant for the deliverables specified in **Appendix A** and in such manner as is provided by GCC F below.

F. PAYMENTS TO THE CONSULTANT

38. Contract Price 38.1 The Contract price is fixed and is set forth in the SCC. The Contract price breakdown is provided in **Appendix C**.

38.2 Any change to the Contract price specified in Clause GCC 38.1 can be made only if the Parties have agreed to the revised scope of Services pursuant to Clause GCC 16 and have amended in writing the Terms of Reference in **Appendix A**.

39. Taxes and Duties 39.1 The Consultant, Sub-consultants and Experts are responsible for meeting any and all tax liabilities arising out of the Contract unless it is stated otherwise in the **SCC**.

39.2 As an exception to the above and as stated in the **SCC**, all local identifiable indirect taxes (itemized and finalized at Contract negotiations) are reimbursed to the Consultant or are paid by the Client on behalf of the Consultant.

40. Currency of Payment 40.1 Any payment under this Contract shall be made in the currency (ies) of the Contract.

41. Mode of Billing and
Payment41.1The total payments under this Contract shall not exceed the Contract
price set forth in Clause GCC 38.1.

41.2 The payments under this Contract shall be made in lump-sum installments against deliverables specified in **Appendix A**. The payments will be made according to the payment schedule stated in the **SCC**.

41.2.1 <u>Advance payment:</u> Unless otherwise indicated in the SCC, an advance payment shall be made against an advance payment bank guarantee acceptable to the Client in an amount (or amounts) and in a currency (or currencies) specified in the SCC. Such guarantee (i) is to remain effective until the advance payment has been fully set off, and (ii) is to be in the form set forth in **Appendix D**, or in such other form as the Client shall have approved in writing. The advance payments will be set off by the Client in equal portions against the lump-sum installments specified in the SCC until said advance payments have been fully set off.

41.2.2 <u>The Lump-Sum Installment Payments.</u> The Client shall pay the Consultant within sixty (60) days after the receipt by the Client of the deliverable(s) and the cover invoice for the related lump-sum installment payment. The payment can be withheld if the Client does not approve the submitted deliverable(s) as satisfactory in which case the Client shall provide comments to the Consultant within the same sixty (60) days period. The Consultant shall thereupon promptly make any necessary corrections, and thereafter the foregoing process shall be repeated.

41.2.3 <u>The Final Payment</u>. The final payment under this Clause shall be made only after the final report have been submitted by the Consultant and approved as satisfactory by the Client. The Services shall then be deemed completed and finally accepted by the Client. The last lump-sum installment shall be deemed approved for payment by the Client within ninety (90) calendar days after receipt of the final report by the Client unless the Client, within such ninety (90) calendar day period, gives written notice to the Consultant specifying in detail deficiencies in the Services, the final report. The Consultant shall thereupon promptly make any necessary corrections, and thereafter the foregoing process shall be repeated. 41.2.4 All payments under this Contract shall be made to the accounts of the Consultant specified in the SCC.

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41.2.4 With the exception of the final payment under 41.2.3 above, payments do not constitute acceptance of the whole Services nor relieve the Consultant of any obligations hereunder.

42. Interest on Delayed
Payments42.1If the Client had delayed payments beyond fifteen (15) days after the
due date stated in Clause GCC 41.2.2, interest shall be paid to the Consultant
on any amount due by, not paid on, such due date for each day of delay at the
annual rate stated in the SCC.

G. FAIRNESS AND GOOD FAITH

43. Good Faith 43.1 The Parties undertake to act in good faith with respect to each other's rights under this Contract and to adopt all reasonable measures to ensure the realization of the objectives of this Contract.

H. SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTES

44. Amicable Settlement 44.1 The Parties shall seek to resolve any dispute amicably by mutual consultation.

44.2 If either Party objects to any action or inaction of the other Party, the objecting Party may file a written Notice of Dispute to the other Party providing in detail the basis of the dispute. The Party receiving the Notice of Dispute will consider it and respond in writing within fourteen (14) days after receipt. If that Party fails to respond within fourteen (14) days, or the dispute cannot be amicably settled within fourteen (14) days following the response of that Party, Clause GCC 45.1 shall apply.

45. Dispute Resolution 45.1 Any dispute between the Parties arising under or related to this Contract that cannot be settled amicably may be referred to by either Party to the adjudication/arbitration in accordance with the provisions specified in the **SCC**.

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II. General Conditions Attachment 1 Fraud and Corruption *(Text in this Appendix <u>shall not</u> be modified)*

1. Purpose

1.1 The Bank's Anti-Corruption Guidelines and this annex apply with respect to procurement under Bank Investment Project Financing operations.

2. Requirements

 - iv. "coercive practice" is impairing or harming, or threatening to impair or harm, directly or indirectly, any party or the property of the party to influence improperly the actions of a party;
 - v. "obstructive practice" is:
 - (a) deliberately destroying, falsifying, altering, or concealing of evidence material to the investigation or making false statements to investigators in order to materially impede a Bank investigation into allegations of a corrupt, fraudulent, coercive, or collusive practice; and/or threatening, harassing, or intimidating any party to prevent it from disclosing its knowledge of matters relevant to the investigation or from pursuing the investigation; or
 - (b) acts intended to materially impede the exercise of the Bank's inspection and audit rights provided for under paragraph 2.2 e. below.
- b. Rejects a proposal for award if the Bank determines that the firm or individual recommended for award, any of its personnel, or its agents, or its sub-consultants, sub-contractors, service providers, suppliers and/ or their employees, has, directly or indirectly, engaged in corrupt, fraudulent, collusive, coercive, or obstructive practices in competing for the contract in question;
- c. In addition to the legal remedies set out in the relevant Legal Agreement, may take other appropriate actions, including declaring misprocurement, if the Bank determines at any time that representatives of the Borrower or of a recipient of any part of the proceeds of the loan engaged in corrupt, fraudulent, collusive, coercive, or obstructive practices during the procurement process, selection and/or execution of the contract in question, without the Borrower having taken timely and appropriate action satisfactory to the Bank to address such practices when they occur, including by failing to inform the Bank in a timely manner at the time they knew of the practices;
- d. Pursuant to the Bank's Anti- Corruption Guidelines and in accordance with the Bank's prevailing sanctions policies and procedures, may sanction a firm or individual, either indefinitely or for a stated period of time, including by publicly declaring such firm or individual ineligible (i) to be awarded or otherwise benefit from a Bank-financed contract, financially or in any other manner;¹ (ii) to be a

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¹ For the avoidance of doubt, a sanctioned party's ineligibility to be awarded a contract shall include, without limitation, (i) applying for pre-qualification, expressing interest in a consultancy, and bidding, either directly or as a nominated sub-contractor, nominated consultant, nominated manufacturer or supplier, or nominated service provider, in respect of such contract, and (ii) entering into an addendum or amendment introducing a material modification to any existing contract.

nominated² sub-contractor, consultant, manufacturer or supplier, or service provider of an otherwise eligible firm being awarded a Bank-financed contract; and (iii) to receive the proceeds of any loan made by the Bank or otherwise to participate further in the preparation or implementation of any Bank-financed project;

e. Requires that a clause be included in bidding/request for proposals documents and in contracts financed by a Bank loan, requiring (i) bidders (applicants/proposers), consultants, contractors, and suppliers, and their sub-contractors, sub-consultants, service providers, suppliers, agents personnel, permit the Bank to inspect³ all accounts, records and other documents relating to the procurement process, selection and/or contract execution,, and to have them audited by auditors appointed by the Bank.

³ Inspections in this context usually are investigative (i.e., forensic) in nature. They involve fact-finding activities undertaken by the Bank or persons appointed by the Bank to address specific matters related to investigations/audits, such as evaluating the veracity of an allegation of possible Fraud and Corruption, through the appropriate mechanisms. Such activity includes but is not limited to: accessing and examining a firm's or individual's financial records and information, and making copies thereof as relevant; accessing and examining any other documents, data and information (whether in hard copy or electronic format) deemed relevant for the investigation/audit, and making copies thereof as relevant; interviewing staff and other relevant individuals; performing physical inspections and site visits; and obtaining third party verification of information.



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² A nominated sub-contractor, nominated consultant, nominated manufacturer or supplier, or nominated service provider (different names are used depending on the particular bidding document) is one which has been: (i) included by the bidder in its pre-qualification application or bid because it brings specific and critical experience and know-how that allow the bidder to meet the qualification requirements for the particular bid; or (ii) appointed by the Borrower.

Technical Assistance for the Livestock (Informal Dairy & Piggery) Sub-Component of the World Bank Financed APART

1. BACKGROUND

- a) Government of Assam (GoA), through the Government of India has received a loan of US\$200 million from the World Bank (W.B.) for implementation of the "Assam Agribusiness and Rural Transformation Project (APART)". Assam Rural Infrastructure and Agricultural Services (ARIAS) Society is the apex coordinating and monitoring agency for the project. ARIAS Society now intends to utilize a part of this loan to hire a Consultancy agency for providing "Technical Support" to (i) Directorate of Animal Husbandry and Veterinary and (ii) Directorate of Dairy Development, GoA, for development of piggery and informal dairy value chains respectively.
- b) The Project Development Objective (PDO) of APART is to "add value and improve resilience of selected agriculture value chains, focusing on smallholder farmers and agro-entrepreneurs in targeted districts of Assam".
- c) There are four components of the project with different sub components. The first component is Enabling Agri. enterprise Development. The second component is Facilitating Agro Cluster Development. The third component is Fostering Market Led Production and Resilience Enhancement and the fourth component is project Management, Monitoring and Learning.
- d) Under the third Component i.e. "C", APART would support, value addition in the production and postharvest segments of selected agricultural value-chains; facilitate agribusiness investments through inclusive business models that provide opportunities to small farmers and support resilience of agricultural production systems in order to better manage increasing production and commercial risks associated with climate change and marketing of agro produce, in the targeted districts. The project would adopt a cluster strategy within the targeted districts to generate economies of scale; promote vertical and horizontal links between local agricultural enterprises; enable diffusion of innovations and leverage network externalities.
- e) Piggery and informal dairy value chains would be covered under component C of the project. The objective of this component is to enable producers of the priority value chains, in the targeted clusters, to take advantage of the rapidly changing market demand, and enhance resilience of agriculture production systems for increasing production and managing risks associated with climate change. This would be achieved by: the introduction of improved production technologies, and climate resilient solutions; facilitation of collective-action by supporting the establishment of Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs); improving value realization at the farm level through improved cleaning, grading and packing of produce through Common Service Centers (CSCs) managed by FPOs; facilitating better input and output market linkages; and facilitating access to a broad set of financial services and their responsible use by producers.
- 2. OBJECTIVES OF THE ASSIGNMENT: The key objectives of the assignment would be to support the (a) Directorate of Veterinary & Animal Husbandry and (b) Directorate of Dairy Development in: (i) increasing production and productivity by organizing smallholder producers into producer groups to access services, inputs and markets, (ii) developing and equipping a service delivery network (including pig *bandhus*) for breeding including a multiplier scheme for boars and artificial insemination services, feeding and animal health; (iii) Common Service Centres (CSCs) to support access to inputs, post-harvest management including Bulk Milk Coolers (BMCs), small scale slaughter houses; (iv) capacity building through skills training, demonstrations and exposure visits; (v) enhancing market access through enterprise development and promoting aggregation and processing, with a focus on food safety and human health risks; (vi) building state capacity to implement the Food Safety Standard Act for India(FSSAI); and (vii) training and certification of small scale market accors (like milk traders, sweet makers, and butchers) and increasing consumer awareness on food safety.

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- **3. SCOPE OF THE ASSIGNMENT:** The broad scope of the assignment will be three fold:
 - a) Supporting the Directorate of Animal Husbandry and Veterinary in developing and strengthening the pork value chain ;
 - b) Supporting the Directorate of Dairy Development in formalizing the informal milk sector;
 - c) Supporting both Directorate of Animal Husbandry and Veterinary & Directorate of Dairy Development in cross cutting areas like mapping of pork and informal dairy value chains, new feed technologies and food safety etc.

4. DELIVERABLES, REPORTS AND PAYMENT SCHEDULE:

- 4.3 **REPORTS:** ILRI will submit the reports/ documents to the Client (i.e. the State Project Director, ARIAS Society, the Directorate Animal Husbandry & Veterinary and the Directorate of Dairy Development) during the assignment period, in both soft (MS word//Excel and PDF versions) as well as hard copies along with summary report to assess the progress against the targets. All the reports and documents shall be in English language. Further, all reports shall be in draft form for discussion with the State Project Director, the Directorate Animal Husbandry & Veterinary and the Directorate of Dairy Development before finalization. A brief description of these reports is shown below:
 - i) Inception report will include detailed work plan, milestones, methodology and resources to be mobilized to accomplish the assignment. The Inception Report shall be submitted within 30 days of signing the contract agreement.
 - ii) **Six-Monthly report**: At the end of every six months, a report highlighting the technical support activities carried out during the period as per Log-frame shall be submitted within **21** office working days from the completion of every six months.
 - iii) Mid-Term report, to be submitted at least 30 days before the visit of World Bank's Mid Term Review Mission, should focus on (a) implementation processes and recommend mid-term corrections, if any, required to achieve the prescribed targets, adjustments in the project design (b) implementation arrangements to overcome identified bottlenecks and (c) socio-economic analysis, in addition to overall review of the progress of project implementation under different

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activities and sub-activities, as per the approved action plan covering all deliverables (technical and physical) with suggestions for improvements..

- iv) **Final/ End of Project report** will have to be submitted by the Consultant 45 days before the closure of the consultancy assignment. The report shall include a comprehensive overall assessment of the implementation, impact of the activities in the pork and informal dairy value chains including on productivity, production, improvement of the socio-economic status of the informal dairy and pig farmers, etc.
- 4.4 **Documents required for making payment:** ILRI will submit six-monthly invoice supported by (i) six-monthly progress report as per the prescribed format agreed with the client and (ii) a certification from the Directorate Animal Husbandry & Veterinary and the Directorate of Dairy Development stating that technical advisory services have been provided as per the targeted deliverables of the contract.

4.5 The technical details of the deliverables under the assignment are mentioned below:

4.5.1 Informal Dairy Value Chain:

- 4.5.1.1 **Facilitating transformation from informal to formal**
- i) Designing and developing detailed plans, tools and protocols for Training Monitoring & Certification (TMC) Scheme: The consultant would support Directorate of Dairy Development (DDD) in designing an updated training curriculum, training calendar and work-plan for relevant informal milk value chain players. Protocols for Training of Trainers (ToTs) and field trainings, tools for monitoring the trained actors, for establishing the certification and licensing programme would also be developed, besides developing the capacity of DDD on all these fronts.
- ii) Training course development for informal dairy value chain actors: Based on a rapid participatory assessment of knowledge, attitude and practices of informal milk value chain actors, the consultant will develop customized training courses for all informal value chain actors (producers, traders, sweet makers and cottage processors) in consultation with DDD. The course tools will include manuals, handouts and practical exercises, games etc and should adopt participatory learning, learning by doing, exposure visits, on the job training, continuous mentoring and follow up. The course should include topics related to improved dairy practices (technically and economically feasible in local context), clean and hygienic practices in production, handling, storage and marketing, improved milk and product quality and safety, reducing wastage and spoilage, value addition, prevailing rules and regulations for running informal milk/product business, business management, marketing and so on. Relevant stakeholders' views including organizations of national international repute should be considered while designing these courses. The printing/publishing of these course materials would be taken care by DDD.
- iii) Organizing Training of Trainers (ToTs): It is proposed to organize ToTs for resource persons in the project districts who would in turn impart training to the actual trainees. There will be four different types of ToTs based on the value chain actors targeted (producers, traders, sweet makers & cottage processors) and each type of ToT would be attended by about 5 resource persons from each project district. The ToTs would also be open to the district DDD and AHVD officials, interested resource persons from Krishi Vigyan Kendras (KVKs), and representatives of producers and traders associations. The ToTs will be a imparted using various tools and techniques including classroom sessions, demonstrations (e.g. milk test), field training, group discussions, role plays, management games, online professional tools/technologies, out of sessions support like email, social media, whats app, SMS etc. Adult learning technique will also be taught in the training. Women participation would be encouraged in such ToTs. In the ToTs, the resource persons will learn practically and in a hands-on way so that they can gather knowledge and confidence.

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iv) Technical Assistance for rolling out the TMC program in the field: The Consultant will provide technical support to DDD in rolling out the TMC programme in the field. In the first few field trainings Consultant will facilitate Directorate but thereafter the Directorate staff will own and take the responsibility themselves. With the trainees consent, all information will be entered in a computer database for future reference and follow-up during monitoring and certification and beyond. For quality checks, the Consultant should make random field visits on a sample basis during training and provide guidance to the resource persons in case training is not going satisfactory. If "unsatisfactory" emerges to be the trend, then deeper and scaled up involvement of the Consultant would be required. The Consultant's senior representative would be an invited member on the State Advisory Body (of late called JCMC) and contribute in planning the activities related to TMC.

4.5.1.2 Building Capacity on lab technologies for milk safety & quality assurance under FSSA

- i) Developing lab protocol and quality assurance system under DDD for adherence to FSSA: The critical gaps in lab infrastructure and resources would be identified to address the gaps and to identify the range of tests to be carried out. The Consultant would work with DDD to design and develop standard protocols for laboratory work; and to put in place a food quality and safety assurance process. The protocols would include procedures from sample collection in the field to packaging, storing, dispatching, long-term storage and analysis. The Consultant would also advise on discarding biological samples and sending for advanced testing, taking appropriate measures for safety.
- ii) Capacity building of Government officers on laboratory technology: The training needs of laboratory technicians and Food Safety Officers (FSOs) will be assessed quickly and a customized training curriculum will be developed by the Consultant. Training for laboratory technicians is proposed in the laboratory as well as in the field and it will cover the whole process from sampling, sample collection, packaging, transportation, handling and laboratory work. The laboratory tests include simple and rapid milk tests that can be conducted in the field or basic laboratory as well as advanced test like isolation and identification of microbes, ELISA, use of HPLC, PCR etc. In addition, the Consultant would build Directorate's capacity on how to collect samples in a probabilistic way with denominator data, so that the samples are representative of the dairy value chain, and also how to conduct risk-targeted sampling to allow for a more efficient use of resources, by concentrating testing where it is most useful. Testing will also be part of a surveillance and response program that includes official reporting and action under FSSA.
- iii) Handholding support for health risk assessment and risk communication in milk value chain under FSSA-2006: The focus here would be to make the Directorate and district level staff under the Directorate FSSA-2006 ready and would be accomplished in a "farm to table" approach so that critical control points can be identified where food must be checked and control action can be taken. Under this, it is proposed to assess the major health risk in terms of adulterants, microbial load, antimicrobial residues and aflatoxins. The findings would be an important baseline for the state to design any action for improving milk quality and safety. The information would also support in the content development for consumers' awareness campaign and serve as a baseline indicator for project outcome assessment. On job capacity building of government officers would be an important element of this task. For risk communication, seamless information exchange among the associated stakeholders like value chain actors, consumers, dairy processors, the academic community and other interested parties would be ensured. The information would be built upon the risk management decisions and would be used to develop knowledge and extension products. This could include judicious use of antimicrobials, consultation with veterinarians before use, following milk

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withdrawal periods after use of antimicrobials (as an example). A risk assessment study may be carried out before and after the TMC interventions in order to assess the impact of the interventions in terms of improved milk quality and safety.

Improve Productivity: Mastitis and Reproductive Health Management: It 4.5.1.3 is proposed to demonstrate a mastitis management programme in a small cluster (around 100 farmers) under the project. Under this, all dairy animals in the project households will be tested with California Mastitis Test (CMT). If successful, this would be replicated in other clusters as per the prevalence of the disease. Later, extension and information materials will be developed, which the Directorate would use in its campaigns, training and capacity building programs etc. Besides mastitis management, the project would build a reproductive health management program addressing diseases/anomalies/syndromes like brucellosis, abortion, repeat breeding, infertility, metritis, endo-metritis etc which cause huge losses and are a risk to human health as well. The Consultant should be able to demonstrate the benefits that can be achieved by disease control, motivating & scale-out. Finally, it should result in reduced disease incidence and improved productivity. Reproductive health management camps will be organized in the project villages with the support of local veterinary officers, experts from the veterinary department and teachers from College of Veterinary Sciences (CoVS). Record of health camps organized, animals treated, treatments given should be maintained not only with the project but also with the individual beneficiaries for their animals so that traceability is easy. It will also be useful for disease incidence/outbreak forecast and preparing future combating strategies.

4.5.2 Support in strengthening the pork value chain

4.5.2.1 Strengthening of informal pork value chain

- i) Training courses on pig management, pork retailing and para-veterinary services: The consultant will develop training manuals and handouts both in English and Assamese language for training of pig farmers and other value chain players. These courses should incorporate practical tools for better productivity, business opportunity, and improved hygiene and safety. The methodology used for training of value chain players would be participatory learning, model farm visits, visits to modern retail outlets, on-the-job training, mentoring and follow up. A fine balance of men and women trainees would be maintained in these training programs.
- ii) Organizing Training of Trainers (ToTs): The resource persons of the project districts would be trained by the consultants who will in turn impart training to the actual trainees. Their involvement would begin in the second year and would go on increasing. By the end of the project, they should be able to take this responsibility independently. In each district, there will be around 5 trainers trained, totaling to around 80 in all 16 project districts. In addition, The ToT sessions would also be attended by the district AHVD officials, interested resource persons from College of Veterinary Sciences (CoVS), Krishi Vigyan Kendras (KVKs) and successful producers, pork retailers and livestock service providers. Language used in these training programs would be a mixed of Hindi, English and Assamese and should be adjusted to the suitability of the trainees. Women's participation as a trainer will be encouraged and the format, timing etc will be gender-sensitive., taking into consideration the needs and capacities of women who dominate pig production.
- iii) Technical Assistance for Rolling out of Training, Monitoring & Certification (TMC) programme: The project plans to transform traditional roadside pork vendors to licensed hygienic pork vendors through training and capacity building and then continuously monitoring them and finally certifying them. The consultant will provide technical support to Directorate of Animal Husbandry and Veterinary in

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rolling out the programme in the field. The consultant would support the Directorate in developing detailed plans and protocols for imparting training and monitoring. Monitoring will continue for 6 months to ensure adoption of improved practices. Officers and trainers would be required and motivated to follow the protocol to ensure quality and effectiveness of trainings. Initially, the consultant will help the Directorate in facilitating the process but thereafter the Directorate will own and take the responsibility. For ensuring the quality of training, consultant will make visits intermittently during the training and provide guidance to the resource persons as needed. Each training must be followed by a fresher course and professional mentoring and follow up is especially required for *Pig Bandhus* as they conduct animal health activities.

4.5.2.2 Building capacity in lab technologies for food safety and quality assurance

- i) Building capacity on laboratory technologies for pork safety and quality assurance to comply with FSSA: The consultant would assess the training need of laboratory technicians and Food Safety Officers (FSOs) quickly and a customized training curriculum would be developed to train them. Training for laboratory technicians will cover the whole process from identifying where to sample, sample collection, packaging, transportation, laboratory analysis, results recording and action. Advanced tests such as pathogen isolation, identification of microbes and use of ELISA, PCR and HPLC will be taught wherever possible depending on the lab facilities. The consultant will conduct training on how to collect samples in a probabilistic way with denominator data so that the samples are representative of the pork value chain, and also how to conduct risk-targeted sampling allowing for a more efficient use of resources. Local learning resources would also be identified to sustain the momentum gained during the project to post project period.
- ii) **Developing protocol and quality assurance system to comply with FSSA:** An assessment of the existing lab facilities under the Directorate in project districts would be carried out and gaps identified by the consultant. Consultant would guide the Directorate to overcome these gaps. The consultant will support the Directorate in designing and developing standard protocols for laboratory and putting in place a food quality and safety assurance process. The protocols should include practices from identifying where and when to sample, method of sample collection, packaging, storing, dispatching, long-term storing, analysis, discarding of biological samples and safe referral to laboratories for advanced testing.

4.5.2.3 Improving Productivity

- i) Mentoring Government Pig Breeding Farms & Low Cost Pig Housing: The capacities of Government pig breeding farms including the personnel managing these farms would be assessed and augmented to run the farms effectively and efficiently based on the critical gaps identified. The consultant is expected to develop a Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) for pig breeding farm management in consultation with the pig breeding farm managers and workers. Based on a pilot, SOP would be modified and implemented. The consultant would follow up with farms in first 2-3 years to ensure that SOP is properly followed and provide technical guidance to put a system in place for grading and disposing piglets for different purposes, culling and replacement of stock and sourcing of new breeding stock. Necessary exposure trips to organizations/farms of national and international repute will also be facilitated to reinforce this capacity. The consultant would support the Directorate to design and promote suitable low cost housing model for small pig farms that is self-replicable.
- ii) **Support on Evidence based pig breeding policy:** The consultant would support the Directorate in drafting, through an extensive consultation process with all relevant stakeholders in addition to local, regional and national level responsible

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organizations and institutions, a comprehensive pig breeding policy for the State. This initiative will be supported by a participatory breed mapping exercise conducted in randomly selected villages from different agro-climatic zones to understand framers' preferred breed, as well as the productive and reproductive performance of different breeds, resistance to diseases, demand-supply situation of piglets, scope for conservation of indigenous breeds etc. Cues from pig breeding policies elsewhere (country & globe) would be taken to formulate an Assam specific policy.

4.5.3 Cross Cutting:

- 4.5.3.1 Mapping of dairy & Pig Clusters: The consultant would be required to survey and map the dairy and piggery clusters, recording actor types and numbers, volumes traded, dairy and veterinary care infrastructure available, farmer organizations (DCS, SHG, MPI) already existing, markets, connectivity infrastructure and other relevant information in each project district before starting to implement the actual interventions. The primary information gathered should be validated and supported by secondary information and the resulting report will set out the existing situation, gaps and the strategies to plug the gaps. In this exercise, officials of both AHVD and DDD will be involved and their capacity will be strengthened to do this type of reconnaissance before planning fieldwork. The mapping will also help the local officers to gather specific information about their clusters and create linkages with relevant actors. The cluster and value chain maps would form an important asset in designing other future programs as well in dairy and piggery subsector.
- 4.5.3.2 **Technical assistance for introducing new feed technologies:** The consultant would provide technical support to DDD and Directorate of Animal Husbandry in entrepreneurship development in animal feed sector. This would include facilitating interaction between entrepreneurs and equipment suppliers, ingredient suppliers, maize growers and market agents through organizing interactive sessions. The consultant would guide AHVD in sourcing improved varieties of seeds with higher feed values (e.g. Quality Protein Maize) and promoting food-feed crops such as maize, sweet potato, tapioca, colocasia (taro). The consultant should be able to establish a cross-learning system between West Assam Milk Union Limited (WAMUL), DDD & AHVD officials on interventions related to feed and fodder. This intervention should enable development of an improved entrepreneurial ecosystem in state animal feed sector.
- 4.5.3.3 **Designing communication strategy and awareness building of consumers:** The consultant would provide inputs to both Directorates as well as IEC campaign agency hired centrally by the project. The consultant is expected to quickly investigate consumer preference and behavior related to milk and pork in order to design a communication strategy and the inputs would be based on the results of this investigation.
- 4.5.3.4 **Technical Advisory Services to Directorates of Dairy and Veterinary for project planning and implementation:** The consultant would provide advisory services to both the Directorates i.e. Animal Husbandry and Dairy on different aspects of project planning, implementation and management as and when requirement arises. This support would be intensive in the beginning and would go on reducing in such a manner that by end of the project, these Directorates should be able to self sustain these activities without any external support.

4.5.3.5

Facilitate Collective Action and Coordination among Project Partners & Beyond: The Consultant would facilitate consultations among AHVD, DDD,

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Agriculture Department, WAMUL and ICAR-NRCP in regards to interventions on feed, fodder, crop residue and livestock waste management/reuse. The consultant would also support integration with other project value chains (e.g. maize) and activities such as business planning support for milk and pork value chain actors. Hence the Consultant would play a coordinating role with all concerned stakeholders in the milk and pork value chains. On food safety, the Consultant would facilitate interaction among AHVD, DDD, FSSA, Health Department, Municipalities, AAU and NRCP for collective actions.
